My daughter wanted a vintage look for her wedding dress, so the lace you see in the bodice was taken from my mother's 1951 wedding gown. I replaced the zipper closure with thirty-four buttons and loops (all original to Grandmom's 1951 gown). Although quite yellowed with age, the antique lace came out beautifully (after a five-day soaking in a tub of OxiClean!).

I used a flesh-tone organza to line the lace areas so they would appear sheer; the gown itself was made from imported silk, I was able to add a lace "over-train" using the entire original train from my mom's gown (and yes, at age eighty-three, Pauline was there to admire the re-creation of her vintage wedding gown!).

I've made three other wedding gowns over the years (my own, my sister's, and my oldest daughter's), but this is the first from a Vogue pattern. So elegant, form fitting, flattering, and stunning for the outdoor, garden wedding on a hot day in Charlottesville, Virginia!
